CrimeFest names shortlists

Bristol's new crime fiction convention CrimeFest is launching an award with Audible this year, to crown the best crime audiobook. The winner of the Audible Sounds of Crime award will be announced during the festival, which runs from 5th to 8th June. It will be chosen

from a shortlist comprising audiobooks *Blaze* by Richard Bachman (Hodder), Lee Child's *Bad Luck & Trouble* (Random House), Tess Gerritsen's *The Mephisto Club* (BBC Audiobooks), David Hewson's *The Seventh Sacrament* (W F Howes), and Ian Rankin's *Exit Music* (Orion).

The festival organisers are also running the Last Laugh Award for best humorous crime novel of 2007, chosen from Declan Burke's *The Big O* (Hag's Head), *Murder*- ing Americans by Ruth Dudley

Vampire feeding frenzy

It is hardly a new trend, admittedly, but the cult of the vampire has never been stronger among all things entertainment.

Ever since "Buffy The Vampire Slayer", TV has been obsessed with the genre, and the new generation of vampire series includes the more grown-up "Moonlight" on Living TV with British actress Sophia Myles, which features a private investigator vampire, and the new "Blade" TV series adapt-

ed from the comic-book character and film franchise on Virgin 1. ITV1, meanwhile, has commissioned a new drama series that gives Bram Stoker's *Dracula* a new spin, setting it in modern-day London.

In film, the Russian adaptations of Sergei Lukyanenko books, which started with *The Night Watch* (Arrow), have become cult favourites, and recent Hollywood offerings include graphic novel adaptation

Books are seeing a similar frenzy. On going to press, Amazon.co.uk's hot releases Top 50 boasted six vampire novels alongside the more obvious new titles from Gordon Ramsay and Karin Slaughter.

Among them were From Dead to Worse (Gollancz) by Charlaine Harris; Lover Enshrined from J R Ward's Black Dagger Brotherhood series (Piatkus);

and the next—adult—offering from vampire teen queen Stephenie Meyer, *The Host* (Sphere).

Other titles include Karen Chance and her Cassie Palmer series, the latest of which is *Embrace the Night* (Penguin); more from Lynsay Sands' Argeneau Vampire series (Anova); and *Blood Noir*, the new Anita Blake Vampire Hunter book from Laurell K Hamilton (Orbit).

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
